Gertie Fowler:

Today is January 22nd 2009 and I'm here in Forteau with Phyllis Roberts and Phyllis is gonna talk to me today about her wedding day. So ah, Phyllis would you like to share your memories with me, 'cause you've been married fifty one years, you said, January 16th, 1958. Okay.

Phyllis Roberts:

Yeah. We planned our wedding date on'fer January 16th, 1958 and then the Coastal Boat use to run from St. John's to Corner Brook and of course the United Minister was stationed in Red Bay, same as he is now. And ah....just a few days before this date, January 16th, ah... the Northern Ranger was makin' her trip and, I think it must have been probably a week earlier then the 16th, and he came up.... the minister was Reverend Upwards ,,,and he came up on the Northern Ranger andbut he didn't came ashore here.

He was on his way to Corner Brook for some other business, he didn't say what, so ah.....what he did was he send a note well the mail the mail use to come ashore in the mail boats then from the boats and ah....he send a note ashore with one of the men to give Aunt Bessie Flynn, she was the post mistress. To give Aunt Bessie Flynn, to give me or Ken, either one, that saying he was on he's way to Corner Brook but he wouldn't be able to come back and do the wedding.

So at that time, we had everything baked; cakes, pies, and everything ready for the meals, so we didn't know what we were going to do, since we had all the cakes and everything done.

Gertie Fowler:

That's true.

Phyllis Roberts:

And dad.... by then, dad dad had a license to marry and to bury and to Christian. He was sort of a lay person. He use to travel the coast from whichever, L'Anse au Clair, or L'Anse au Loup, or wherever they needed to for a wedding or funeral or a.....or a baptism or something. So ah.... I said to him one day, I said "dad, would you marry

me?" (laughs). And he looked at me and he said "why not?". I said "would you marry me?" He said "Yes". I said "okay. We'll have our wedding on the sixteenth of January."

So ah....we got everything ready for the wedding and ah....we went to the church, and ...the Anglican Church and he married us. And at that time, there was five dollars for a wedding, hey?

Oh. Okay.

Phyllis Roberts:

They use to give him five dollars, so I give him the five dollars and he gave it back to me.

Gertie Fowler:

Oh. Okay. Nice. So.....

Phyllis Roberts:

"No" he said, "that's a wedding gift for ye"

Gertie Fowler: God love 'em.

Phyllis Roberts: Yeah. So.....

Gertie Fowler: So ah.... who was your father, now?

Phyllis Roberts: Edward Flynn.

Gertie Fowler: Okay.

Phyllis Roberts: Yeah.

Gertie Fowler: So, Phyllis ah... the boat was probably makin' her last trip, I guess, hey?

Did you have a dance?

Phyllis Roberts:

And ah... yes, we had a dance. We went over to the community hall and Mr. Jeff Wyatt played for our dance. He played the violin.

Gertie Fowler:

Is that right?

Phyllis Roberts: Yup.

He told Ken, when he got married that he want to play the violin for a dance. So we came up in his snowmobile. Parked his snowmobile there against... this house in fact. Parked his snowmobile there against the driveway and ah.... we all after the wedding and after the supper and everything, we all went over in the community hall and we danced our feet off. Until daylight.

What kind of dance was that now?
